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"Aqabat Jaber" (Passing Through) is a lukewarm documentary filmed in November 1986 entirely in the camp of the same name in the West Bank just 10 month after California Voice Managing Editor Stan West visited this barren village near Jericho. Dusty and without adequate food, water and medical supplies, this camp contains some Black Palestinians with dreadlocks who told this reporter their history on this land goes back 4.000 years.

Residents in the film expressed a similar pride for the bulldozed land where their Canaanite ancestor bones were buried. Directed by noted Israeli filmmaker Eyal Sivan. *"This film is beyond politics,"* said Henri Carlier-Bresson upon seeing it. *"It is about country people confirmed for the last 38 years in refugee camps about their humiliation over being severed from their land."*

"Wedding in Galilee," By Michael Kheleifi, a Palestinian now living in Belgium, is a lush look at the life of Arabs celebrating a traditional wedding while heavily-armed Israeli soldiers nervously shake down the ceremony before the nuptial blood from the matrimonial sheet can dry.
